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Introduction

In the second half of 2023 – first half of 2024, the Project in Ukraine faced significant challenges due to the ongoing Russia-Ukraine war, impacting municipal operations through increased missile and drone attack risks. Adaptive measures, including a shift from offline to online activities and enhanced venue security, were implemented to maintain continuity and safety. Additionally, a blockade at the Polish-Ukrainian border complicated equipment imports for municipal projects, prompting the exploration of alternative import routes. Fiscal changes, reallocating a significant portion of personal income tax from local to military support, also posed financial challenges for municipalities, affecting their ability to meet co-financing requirements for M4EG-supported projects, necessitating a more adaptable approach to co-financing.

Key achievements

- Recognizing the profound impact of the conflict in Ukraine, the M4EG emergency response efforts continued into 2023 building on the effective deployment of repurposed funds in 2022. In Ukraine, the focus remained on leveraging and enhancing the existing capacities of local authorities to manage crises and bolster long-term resilience. M4EG supported 39 LAs within the Ukraine Crisis Response component, assisting 60,484 beneficiaries (19,007 direct and 40,577 indirect beneficiaries), including 13,852 IDPs (13,314 direct and 538 indirect beneficiaries). This number also includes the 15 LAs, that were supported by 12 Community Volunteers under the UN Community Volunteers Program, under which the assistance has been provided to 32,077 beneficiaries (16,500 direct and 15,577 indirect beneficiaries), including 10,522 IDPs (9,984 direct and 538 indirect beneficiaries).
- 20 signatory municipalities/LAs engaged in deep demonstration interventions and started the implementation of their local initiatives or piloting portfolios. Two cities are supported within Portfolio Journey, 5 under the Urban Imaginaries Programme and 13 under the Response and Renewal Programme. The total envelope of committed funds constitutes USD 1,205,950. All municipalities formed their capable teams and started implementation in 2023 with the support of M4EG. By the end of April 2024, 8 initiatives are completed and resulted in tangible improvements for the communities, for example, such as establishment of municipal sewing enterprise creating 30 new jobs for IDPs in Nizhyn (Chernihivska oblast); creation of complex rehabilitation department at the Communal Non-profit Enterprise «Bucha Consultative and Diagnostic Center» in Bucha (Kyivska oblast); creation decent living conditions for 80 IDPs in the dormitory in Hlukhiv (Sumska oblast); establishment of educational space to conduct reskilling/upskilling programs for IDPs in Lviv city; establishment of micro-greenery cultivation facility creating new jobs for 3 IDPs in Slavuta (Khmelnytska oblast); creation of the Educational and Advisory Center for businesses in Trostianets (Sumska oblast); support with the restoration of the administrative and public services provision in the frontline village Velyka Oleksandrivka (Khersonska oblast), and establishment of the Municipal Resource Center to support IDPs in Kamianets-Podilskyi (Khmelnytska oblast).



 157 members/municipalities are enrolled in the Urban Learning Centre's Foundations for Future Readiness Online Course with access to knowledge on twin transition, foresight and trends, municipal revenues and finance, and system thinking. Municipal staff's overall capacity to create visions, strategize and manage project implementation in-house, as well as the commitment to go beyond 'business as usual' remains a major shortcoming, and hence focus in all of M4EG engagements.

Challenges

Since the russian full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, the war has continued to cause civilian casualties and hardship, damage to infrastructure and productive assets, and disruption to the economy. The impacts of war are uneven, and the greatest effects are felt by women, persons with disabilities, children and youth, IDPs, and the elderly. According to the Third Rapid Damage and Needs Assessment (RDNA3), by the end of December 2023, an estimated 5.9 million people were recorded as refugees across Europe. 3.7 million people were reported as internally displaced persons (IDPs) as of October 2023. Since the invasion, over 10,000 civilians have lost their lives, thousands have been injured, and millions have lost their homes.

The war has caused significant loss of jobs and income in the private sector, as well as loss of purchasing power and loss of assets among Ukrainians, particularly the most vulnerable. The estimated gross domestic product (GDP) for 2023 is 74 per cent of 2021 GDP in real terms. Poverty and food insecurity have increased: according to initial estimates from a monthly phone survey conducted by the World Bank since April 2023, 9 percent of households reported having run out of food at some point in a 30-day period in November 2023. Overall, there have been dramatic setbacks in the country's development and in its progress toward many of the Sustainable Development Goals.

Meeting the specified needs is critical for long-term recovery and restoration of development progress, but this will take time. Key factors driving this time frame are the war trajectory and financing availability. Restoring Ukraine's productive capacity and reversing the destructive impact of the war will require significant public intervention. This includes rebuilding and improved planning of essential infrastructure, encouraging financing of MSEMs, and supporting the financial sector as the full financial cost of the war is revealed. However, there will be a tremendous social and economic cost if the most urgent needs are not met in the shortest possible time frame—and this cost will be borne especially by the poorest and most vulnerable.

Given the magnitude and complexity of the needs, the GoU has taken an organized, sector-level approach to recovery and reconstruction planning. Coordinated through the MCTID, the Ministry of Economy, and the Reforms Delivery Office of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine, line ministries worked across 20 sectors to identify project-level priorities, determine financing needs, and monitor funding, implementation, and disbursement.

Implementation of the activities

CRISIS RESPONSE

Within its Crisis Response component, M4EG project supported 49 Ukrainian municipalities, with close to 23,000 direct beneficiaries, mainly IDPs and refugees. In essence, the achievements under this output delineate a robust and flexible crisis response, with a commitment to resilience and community support. The adaptive measures, diverse forms of support applied, and strategic sensemaking initiatives underscore a holistic response to a complex and evolving situation, aimed at not just immediate relief but long-term recovery and the strengthening of local governance and social fabric. Most of the repurposed funds were delivered in 2022. A few activities continued in 2023 at a smaller scale, including the Community Volunteers, due to good feedback on their work's relevance and effects. 12 volunteers continued their role part-time in nine regions in the first part of 2023 and finished their activities in June 2023. These volunteers worked closely with municipal and regional authorities to support crisis coordination, including mobilization and distribution of humanitarian aid to war-affected local populations and IDPs, such as food and non-food items, accommodation of IDPs, and provision of basic services. Partnership and support were provided by the UNV Office in Ukraine and the UNV Regional Office in Istanbul.

The destruction of the Kakhovka Hydroelectric Power Plant Dam (hereinafter Kakhovka Dam) in Kherson Oblast on 6 June 2023 led to massive flooding, forcing dozens of thousands of people to flee, and impacting at least 37 towns and villages which have been reported fully or partially flooded, according to the Ukrainian authorities (source UN OCHA, as of 7 June 2023). The M4EG promptly responded to support three affected communities through the provision of five generators that were needed and requested by the municipalities. The equipment supplied electrical power to mobile water purification systems. One coupled mechanism can cover the daily drinking water needs of up to 1,000 people. The system can produce up to 5,000 litres of water per day. Based on the on-site data gathering, the M4EG managed to reach and support 1,157 direct beneficiaries with clean water daily. At the same time, five generators were procured for the Mykolaiv municipality to support the uninterrupted operation of the water supply system in the city (at least 25,000 residents were indirectly supported).

In total in 2023, M4EG supported 39 LAs within the Ukraine Crisis Response component, assisting 60,484 beneficiaries (19,007 direct and 40,577 indirect beneficiaries), including 13,852 IDPs (13,314 direct and 538 indirect beneficiaries). This number also includes the 15 LAs, that were supported by 12 Community Volunteers under the UN Community Volunteers Program, under which the assistance has been provided to 32,077 beneficiaries (16,500 direct and 15,577 indirect beneficiaries), including 10,522 IDPs (9,984 direct and 538 indirect beneficiaries). Community Volunteers were integral to the response, with the continuation of 12 volunteers coordinating with municipal and regional authorities in nine regions distributing humanitarian aid, managing accommodations for internally displaced persons (IDPs), and providing basic services. A notable crisis occurred with the destruction of the Kakhovka Hydroelectric Power Plant Dam in June, prompting M4EG to supply generators to affected communities for water purification needs, directly benefiting 1,157 people daily.

In essence, the achievements under this output delineate a robust and flexible crisis response, with a commitment to resilience and community support. The adaptive measures, diverse forms of support applied, and strategic sensemaking initiatives underscore a holistic response to a complex and evolving situation, aimed at not just immediate relief but long-term recovery and the strengthening of local governance and social fabric.

PATHWAYS FOR ECONOMIC GROWTH (P4EG) ADAPTATION

Management of the territorial communities' development in Ukraine under conditions of decentralized governance, involves the use of a program-targeted approach. One of the areas of its practical implementation is the preparation and implementation of local programs aimed at the development of the most significant areas of community life. Moreover, the full-scale war prioritised the necessity of the recovery processes to be implemented at the local level. All these factors established the background for the changes and updates in the Ukrainian legislation, which concerns the local strategic planning and economic development procedures and methodologies, which in particular described in a dozen of legislative acts and government decrees, which in particular includes the updating of the DREAM platform, as the national tool for tracking and managing the recovery and development infrastructure projects in Ukraine. The European Commission's Directorate-General for Neighbourhood and Enlargement Negotiations (DG NEAR), Arup, EIT Climate-KIC, Tallinn University of Technology (TalTech), and UNDP launched the Pathways for Economic Growth (P4EG) framework, a methodology to design a new generation of local economic development plans in the context of the EU-funded project Mayors for Economic Growth (M4EG).

Founded on the principle of holistic development, the P4EG framework helps cities best assess social, environmental, and economic factors in local development, as well as the potential for scaling up their projects in cooperation with central governments, donors, and European and International Financial Institutions.

Purposing to adapt the proposed P4EG methodology to Ukrainian legislation and local context UNDP in Ukraine has engaged the expert, whose task is to prepare it for possible future piloting in Ukrainian communities to provide, for each stage of the plan's development, an overview of the reasons why to do it, activities to be undertaken, tools, guidelines and resources that are available, as well as of all the methods (co-creation, stakeholder engagement, learning processes) that can be adopted. It is expected that the final document will be discussed with the stakeholders within the planned workshops, including the Lviv Urban Forum, and finalized by the end of August 2024.

RESPONSE AND RENEWAL

The Response and Renewal Grant Programme is aimed at revitalizing and supporting the recovery of local communities impacted by russia's war on Ukraine, launched in March 2023 by the European Commission and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), is reaching its final phase. The progress of the 13 initiatives of Ukrainian municipalities supported within this programme is presented below.

To provide technical advice to the review and initial implementation of these grants in the area of gender mainstreaming, UNDP engaged the relevant expert in the second half of 2023. As of the beginning of 2024, the expert prepared 2 hands-on mentoring online sessions, including the practical material aimed at analysing the extent to which the gender approach is included in the implementation at this stage.

On September 11, the mentoring online sessions with 8 municipality teams from the 1st cohort were conducted. The meeting was attended by representatives of Nova Kakhovka, Bucha, Voznesensk, Nizhyn, Slavuta, Slavutych, Hlukhiv and Kharkiv. During the meeting, the participants deepened their knowledge about gender mainstreaming, as well as the legislative framework and the role of NGOs and local authorities in the implementation of the gender approach in communities.

On September 26, hands-on mentoring online sessions with 5 municipality teams (Kamianets-Podilskyi, Velyka Oleksandrivka, Chernivtsi, Chortkiv, Velyki Luchky) from the 2d cohort.

URBAN IMAGINARIES

The Urban Imaginaries Programme was designed by the EU, UNDP, and Centre for Public Impact (CPI) in 2021 to support 5 small initiatives in Ukraine with approximately 400,000 residents in total, that seek to reimagine or reinvent key aspects of local living by applying human-centered design methodology and developing interventions by engaging with the community and other relevant stakeholders, is also approaching to successful finalization. The current status of the implementation is presented below.


In early 2024, the Urban Imaginaries Advanced Cohort 2023-2024, which has shortlisted 4 Ukrainian cities (Lviv, Sumy, Poltava and Trostianets (Sumy Oblast) from earlier phases of the programme aims to provide advanced support in scaling their grant implementation to attract new opportunities for national and international partnership and financing. The Technical Assistance programme, which will span six months, consists of four cohort-based coaching sessions, alongside individual coaching sessions tailored for the chosen cities.

The Programme started with a Kick-off meeting on 22 February 2024, then followed up by two workshops in March. The implementation will be followed up with a 2-day event in Warsaw, Poland, on 28-29 May 2024 to enable in-person learning and exchange for 8 representatives from the abovementioned deep demonstrators, with support from the Arup team and advance the cohort's thinking around the topic of scaling and sustainability of their projects, including the importance of thought leadership, peer-to-peer exchanges, and collaboration among city leaders to foster local economic development and build "strategic innovation".

PORTFOLIO JOURNEY

The frontrunner cities (Mykolaiv and Ternopil) involved in the Portfolio Journey are progressing through their portfolio implementation and dynamic management at varying stages.

Deep Blue Transition of Mykolaiv. Approximately half of Mykolaiv's residents have been forced to leave, seeking safer conditions amidst the ongoing conflict. The city's unemployment rate has more than doubled, with numerous businesses relocating their operations and workforce. Tax revenues have plummeted by over 30%, and the toll of Russian artillery has left more than 8,000 civilian structures damaged. On both organizational and individual levels, the war creates conditions of uncertainty about the future and reduced capacity for long-term planning. Key uncertainties for the city include the scale of war damage and pervasiveness of the unexploded ordnance (UXO) and its pollution, intensity and proximity of fighting, and return or non-return of residents. The uncertainty and complexity of the situation significantly inflict the capacity for long-term planning. Mykolaiv city administration is acting simultaneously on response and renewal of the city and is through the portfolio leveraging the maritime industrial identity of the city to initiate a "Deep Blue Transition" of Mykolaiv – a change that will facilitate continuous development of its economy, social, technological, and environmental systems.



The Portfolio team aims to create opportunities for popularization and further development of blue and green economies in Mykolaiv. In particular, by raising awareness and increasing the institutional capacity of the local businesses to consolidate their efforts and to improve their cooperation with local authorities for the successful implementation of innovative projects and initiatives. Such cooperation will contribute to the faster transformation of the local economy through the introduction and implementation of the circular economy principles, climate adaptation, sustainable consumption of renewable energy sources and energy efficiency as well as contribute to environmental and marine biodiversity protection. Consequently, all these measures will contribute to the sustainable development of the city, improve the environmental situation, as well as climate neutrality, and increase the competitiveness among local businesses on the national and international markets in the long-term perspectives.



In November 2023, the sensemaking session had been organised in Kyiv with the participation of the Mykolaiv Portfolio Team, representatives of Ukrainian Office of UNDP and the Istanbul Regional Hub, where the two-day discussions and brainstorming helped to update and slightly reshape the approach to the implementation of the Deep Blue Transition Portfolio of Mykolaiv.


This work led to outstanding results on the detailing and clear vision of the development of each option, which were presented during the next sensemaking session on April 30, 2024. Since the portfolio activation in 2023, more than 100 experts were involved, and 12 working group meetings and 5 strategic sessions were held. A Blue Economy platform has been developed, as well as two manuals (on the Organization and Conduct of International Events and the Launching and Support of Startups on the Territory of the Technopark). Mapping of the BLUE ECONOMY ecosystem was carried out. A database of stakeholders has been collected. Recommendations on improving the legal framework for regulating the creation and operation of industrial parks based on mathematical methods have been developed. Tools have been developed for the further comprehensive municipal program to support sustainable business transformation. 3 concepts of transformation/revitalization of promising territories for economic and social recovery of the city of Mykolaiv have been developed.

Green Comfort City Ternopil. The main challenge for Ternopil is the ongoing war that has a substantial influence on the city's economy, resulting in the disruption of supply chains, rising inflation and unemployment rates, as well as low business activities. Additionally, the city experiences an influx of a high number of IDPs (approx. 30,000) coming from the war-torn regions of Ukraine, while many residents emigrated abroad. A high number of veterans returning to the city requires the creation of quality and inclusive public infrastructure. At the same time, the city administration is in search of a strong identity for the city that will become a driver for further development and attracting talents and businesses.




Following a Sensemaking workshop conducted in November 2023, the Portfolio team identified the main directions and overall intent of the city's transformation, which was verified through a deep social listening exercise. The sensemaking session was organised in Ternopil with the participation of the Mykolaiv Portfolio Team, representatives of the Ukrainian Office of UNDP and the Istanbul Regional Hub. Moreover, it engaged the stakeholders from business and NGOs. The brainstorming helped the participants to clearly identify the need for shifting the priorities of Ternopil`s development policy, considering the fast-changing environment.

The portfolio intent "Green Comfort City" has determinative system effects, by creating a new value economy and inclusive and sustainable community with collective ownership. The city intends to become a knowledge hub of sustainable green practices and a leading municipality in Ukraine on green transition which will lead the city to attract and develop more financial instruments to stimulate further growth.



At the current stage, the Portfolio team has come up with a clear structure of the Portfolio (presented below) which includes four learning options (Green Transformation Strategy; Using Green and Nature-based Solutions for Transformation of Public Spaces; "Green Spark" Innovation Challenge for MSMEs; Creation of a Green Transformation Hub).

On April 24, 2024, the Portfolio Team together with the core actors from the UNDP UA office conducted a hybrid (offline/online) presentation of the Ternopil Portfolio Concept to the broader group of local stakeholders, where all the abovementioned initiatives were reached out to the publicity. The learning options will be activated starting in May 2024.

CONNECTING THE NETWORK

Networking and events

M4EG leveraging existing national events and ensuring participation of municipalities:

- A high number of member communities/LAs participated in the Lviv Urban Forum (LUF) in June 2023, where the M4EG initiative were presented to more than 130 participants from Ukrainian municipalities, representing local authorities, architect bureaus, NGOs operating in the sphere of urban development and territorial planning. Moreover, a separate Community listening workshop was organized and attended by over 40 participants, the representatives of UNDP Kyiv and Istanbul presented tools and practical examples of community listening. The participants were actively engaged during the workshop and demonstrated a high interest in further exploring the approach.
- The Ukrainian delegation was represented by 17 deep demonstration municipalities (including 12 mayors/deputies) at the Future-Fit Cities Forum.
- Deputy mayor and focal point of Mykolaiv municipality participated in the Regional Portfolio Sensemaking held in Brussels in April 2023.
- Two online sessions were held for participants of the Foundations for Future Readiness in Ukraine (August & September 2023).
- Several online events with the regional network were held, including the Regional Launch of the first ULC Course (July 2023) and three events in the frames of Urban Talks Summer Series.



FUTURE-READY MUNICIPALITIES

The second half of 2023 and the first half of 2024 were marked with the intensification of the implementation of the grant projects under R&R, UI and Portfolio Approach programmes. Despite the ongoing war in Ukraine, these diverse projects highlighted that local communities retained their capability to launch innovative and successful initiatives. They bolstered their efforts to provide quality services, recover from the consequences of the war and overall build back better for all group of citizens. The first four implemented projects provide assurance that all 20 projects will contribute significantly to the local economic development and recovery of the M4EG members and beyond.



The Centre for Non-Formal Education for Adults has opened in Lviv.

From now on, the first floor of the Central Municipal Library functions as an open space for learning and self-development for citizens, internally displaced persons and veterans.

Here, visitors will be able to register for free courses in psychology, and pre-medical care, and receive training in project management and information technologies. The list of educational programs will increase in response to the requests of visitors.

A separate area of the Centre's work is the reintegration of veterans and their family members through educational opportunities. The project provides psychological, psychiatric, career and legal consultations.

In addition, the Centre plans to launch driving and hippotherapy courses, as well as holding exhibitions and public events.

TROSTIANETS



The activities resulted in the creation of favourable conditions for strengthening entrepreneurship in the Trostianets urban municipality by creating a specialized Educational and Advisory Centre to support and provide appropriate institutional assistance to SMEs.

BUCHA



In Bucha of Kyiv Oblast, the activities are summarized in the establishment of the Complex Rehabilitation Department based on the Bucha Consultative and Diagnostic Centre. This facility will support local authorities in the provision of rehabilitation activities for the war-affected population.



A newly established clothing workshop has opened in the city of Nizhyn, Chernihiv Oblast, creating jobs for 30 residents of the Nizhyn Hromada (community), including internally displaced persons.

The Nizhyn Hromada sewing workshop project aims to help both local residents and internally displaced persons who have had difficulty in finding jobs. Moreover, the new jobs will be open not only to those who already have a specialized tailor's qualification, as senior factory staff will be able to train motivated people and help them learn a new profession.
